Welcome to OXISFF 2021

There's no denying it's been a less than usual year for most, and our 2020 festival was no different: after working according to a 'go big or go home' ethos, the first UK lockdown was announced on the very week we were due to begin. Fortunately, within a month we had managed to reformat everything and ran entirely online from May to July.

Our festival has always looked at things through a slightly different lens. Last year, we adopted a unique approach of showcasing a new block each week, so our audience and filmmakers had something exciting to look forward to whilst the world seemed to be standing still! (We joked that we were 'the world's longest running short film festival'). This strategy served us well in terms of building up relationships with filmmakers and cultivating a loyal audience. Skip a year ahead, and we've now made everything hybrid: half in-person, half online.

Trying to plan a film festival in the midst of a pandemic is not without its challenges. Times have been difficult for so many, both personally and for those in the arts and entertainment industries. So we took the

decision early on that – unlike 2020 – this time we needed to play things safer. This year's mantra has been, 'we really want to host live screenings, but right now it's more important to just keep going'. The good news is that we are now able to accommodate the best of both worlds – including showcasing 100 films online for free!

Each year, new themes emerge. The 2019 programme was steeped in romanticism. In 2020, explorations of loss featured heavily. In 2021, after our shortest submission period ever, the dominant theme has been one of isolation. While this isn't surprising, the sheer amount of humour, warmth, spirit, and creativity the pandemic has produced has both delighted and surprised us.

We have a very distinctive festival in store this year – one that is certainly of its time! To mark this, we have created a special one-off awards category for 'Best Lockdown Short'. We really hope you enjoy our third edition: our team are thrilled and we can't wait to start planning for 2022.

"RenaiDance" is a 3D narrative emotional animation.



For 2021, we aim to build upon both of these very different festival experiences by hosting online and in-person screenings.


